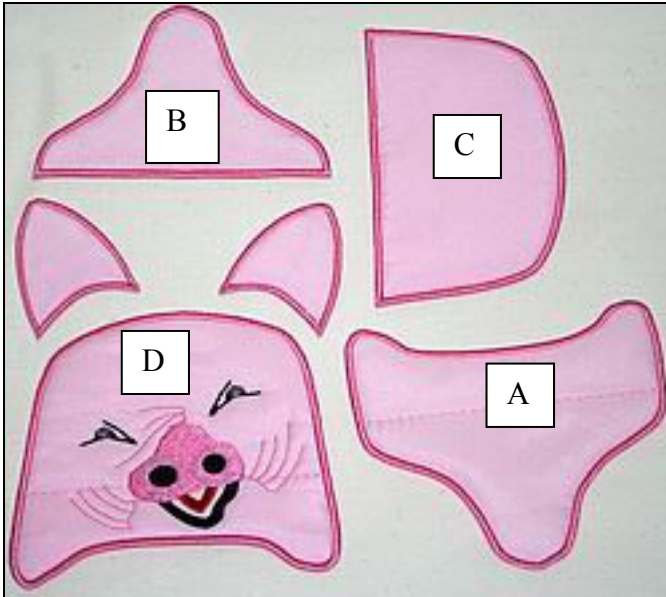
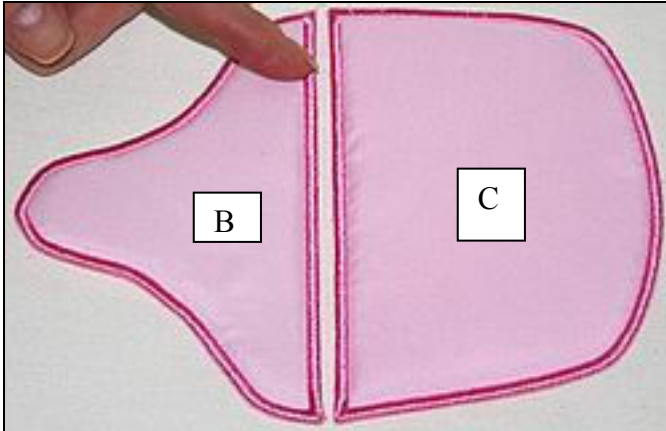

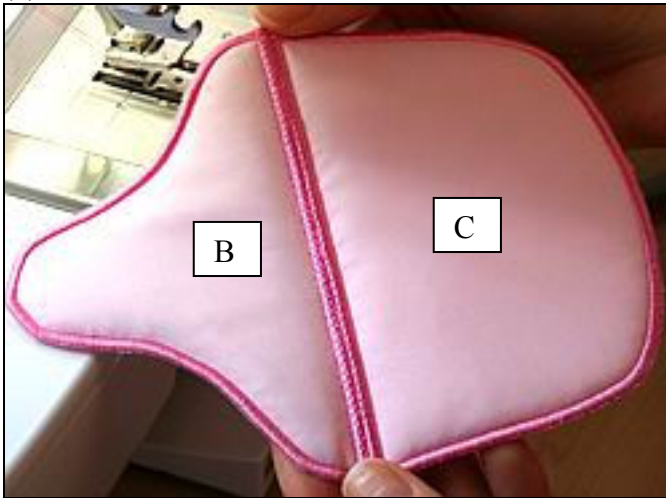
1. Stitch out all the panels as indicated in the "PDF" file included in your zip file.
2. Cut away excess stabilizer and follow the steps below

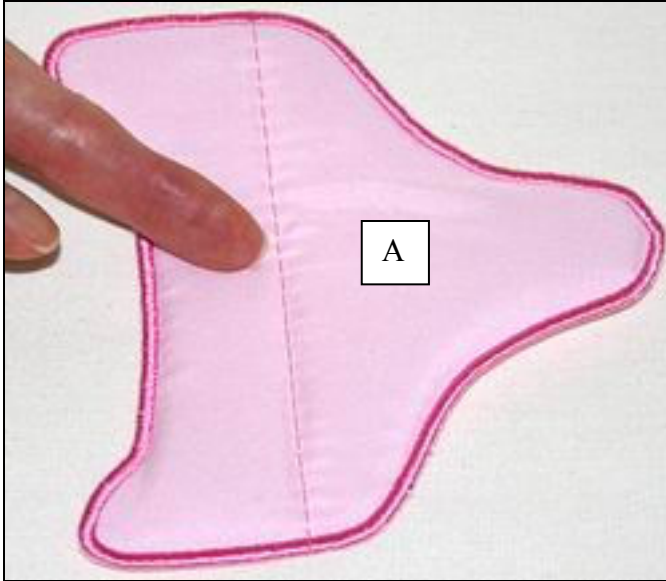
1. Panels "b" and "c" can now be stitched together as indicated. Use a zigzag stitch (SL=2, SW=4)

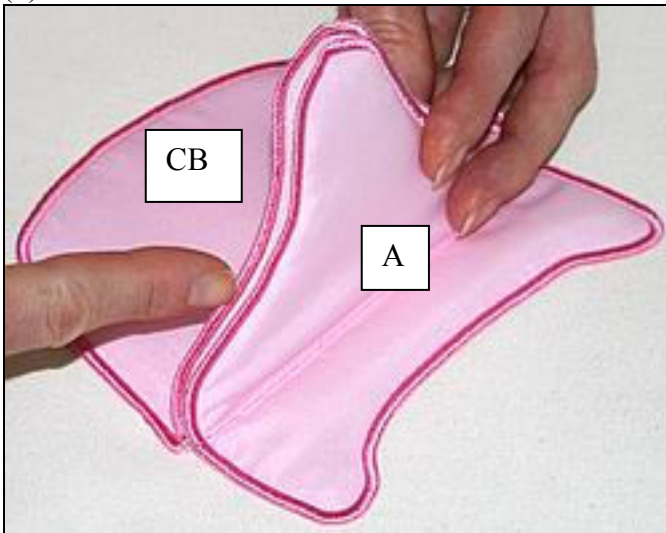
1. Panels "b" and "c" finished

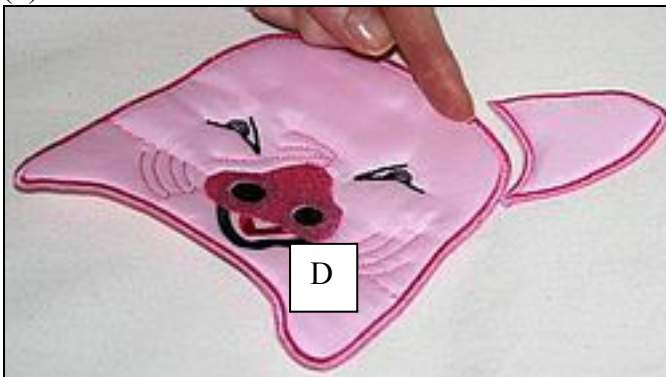
1. Note this indication stitch on panel "a"
2. This indication stitch must align with the base of panel "b" which is now joined to panel "c" as indicated in the previous steps.

1. Stitch all around the area shown upright "a" to "b"
2. **DO NOT** join the section laying flat on the table.

1. Stitch the ears to the indicated areas using a zigzag stitch.

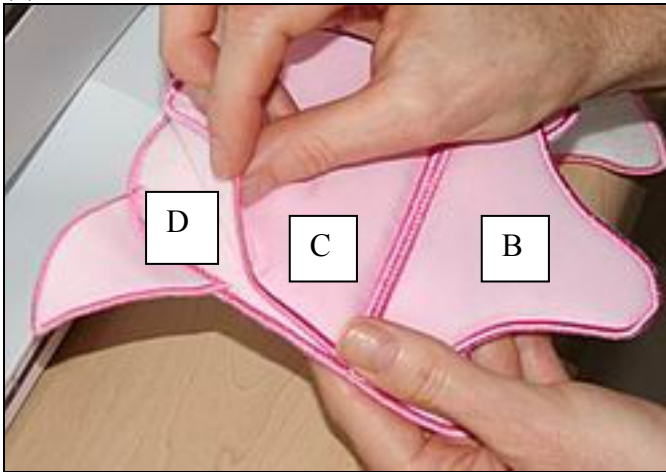

1. Place panel “d” back to back on panels “b” and “c” which is stitched to each other as indicated in photo 3.

2. In this step only stitch panels d to the “c” side of “bc”

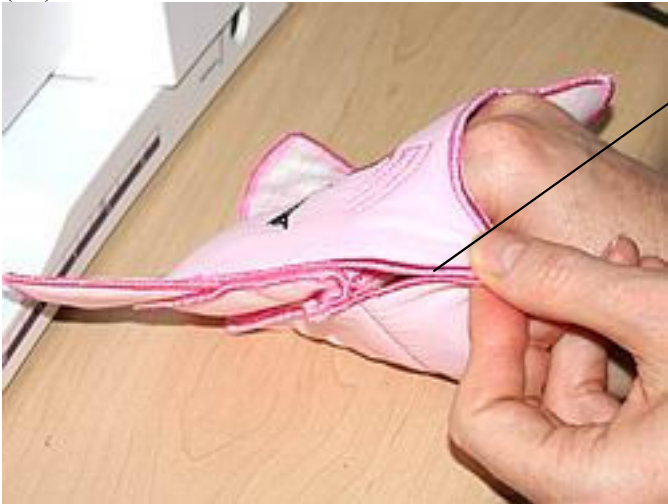
1. Only stitch the “d” panel to “c” panel from the one side -all around- to the other side – **NOT IN THE MIDDLE**

1. Your “oven glove” should have all the panels attached now.
2. However note that the sides are still open and must now be closed with a zigzag stitch.

1. The area indicated with my “thumb” must now be closed.
2. While folding the oven glove “forming a beak”, slowly stitch this area with a zigzag stitch.
3. Be patient as this can take some practice to neatly finish this seam

1. Remove all **indication** stitches.

1. This is what your piggy “**oven**
glove” will look like when finish.

1. How to use your “oven glove”?
Just insert your hand, with thumb
to the bottom section and you can
grab that warm lid...
